idia Hernández lost her sister, Karen Hernández, in a motorcycle accident in 2014. However, Lidia knows that Karen's spirit lives on through the lives she saved and healed as a donor.

Karen devoted much of her time to helping others before she passed away at 18. She worked alongside Lidia, serving food to patients at St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center in Phoenix. The tight-knit family shares Karen's giving spirit. Her mother, Graciela Sánchez, also works at the hospital, helping out in the general surgical room.

Karen's generous nature shone through in how she treated others. She was a sweet and caring person with a soft spot for animals. At school, she helped students with special needs. Karen registered as a donor at 16. She shared her decision on Facebook, explaining that she had registered in honor of the people who passed away in the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

Because of this act of generosity, Karen was able to save five lives and heal countless others. Although Lidia tears up when she talks about her sister, she says that Karen's decision to donate has given her family comfort. "It feels good to know that the last thing we did to honor my sister was fulfill her wish to be a donor. Donation gave us closure because it gave us more time with my sister."

Recently, Karen's family received a letter from her heart recipient, a 62-year-old woman in Yuma. The woman expressed her immense gratitude for Karen's gift. Clutching the letter with tears in her eyes, Lidia explained, "It feels like it's my sister telling us that she's OK."

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# Comforting **Donor Families**

fter just one month as a critical care nurse at Abrazo West Campus, Amber Snelling learned that she was assigned to a donation case. Eric Johnson,\* a registered donor, had been declared brain-dead at the hospital.

At the time, Snelling knew little about donation.

"I didn't know anything about Donor Network of Arizona (DNA)," says Snelling. "Then I saw how involved and organized everyone was. I thought, 'This is amazing.'"

Snelling worked extra shifts to be with Johnson's family, alongside DNA coordinators. She wanted to help his loved ones remember Johnson as he was in life, not as he was in the hospital bed.

"Eric had passed away, so we weren't trying to nurse the patient back to health, but we were trying to be there for his family," says Snelling.

Snelling was inspired to comfort the grieving family, and rushed to the drug store. With her own money, she purchased Johnson's favorite scented body wash. Before his family returned to the hospital to say goodbye, Snelling and her co-workers gave Johnson a sponge bath.

When Johnson's mother arrived, she embraced her son, inhaled deeply and wept.

"Scent sticks with people. We know exactly how our loved ones smell," says Snelling. "I wanted Eric's mom to remember her son's smell and keep that important memory with her."

magine receiving a gift that allowed you to participate in life's most precious moments. Do you envision playing with your children, walking your dog or catching a touchdown pass on the football field? Thanks to 883 generous donors in Arizona last year, thousands of people will receive the life-healing gift of musculoskeletal tissue donation. In fact, there were more musculoskeletal tissue recoveries performed statewide in 2015 than in any prior year. As each tissue donor can heal up to 50 lives, the ripple of this generosity could directly touch 42,250 people. DPD also helps hospitals meet regulatory requirements set by the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

## **Planned Donation Rate**

The percentage of organ donation conversations that follow hospital policy and the plan for each case as agreed upon by Donor Network of Arizona (DNA) and the healthcare team

## Referral Compliance (Comp.) Rate

The percentage of deaths that were referred to DNA

## Tissue Conversion (Conv.) Rate

The number of tissue donors who were recovered expressed as a percentage of patients who are medically suitable for tissue donation
