From Strangers to a Support System

gt. Rich Stringer was traveling home to Phoenix from Texas in October 2016. On a connecting flight through El Paso, he met 30-year-old Jacob Washburn and his mom, Kim Boswell, Dallas natives. From take-off to landing, Rich talked to Washburn and discovered the reason he was going to Phoenix.

Washburn has struggled with cystic fibrosis his whole life. He was going to St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center to be evaluated for his second double-lung transplant. He had already gone through 42 surgeries, and without a transplant he would die.

Rich was touched by the strength of this family and realized it was his purpose to help them.

Washburn was staying in an apartment nearby the hospital with his dad, so Rich and his wife Janne Stringer invited Boswell to stay in their quest bedroom.

"The Stringer family hasn't left our side," Washburn said.
"They've been a huge support system; we don't know what we would have done without them."

Washburn received his double-lung transplant two days before Thanksgiving. He is doing well post-surgery and his relationship with the Stringer family continues to grow. The Stringers have opened their home to Washburn for the next year as he receives treatment.

"I cannot express the unintended miracle this family has given me," says Boswell.



Washburn's successful surgery at St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center has a deeper meaning for Rich. He has faced tragedy many times in his 20 years with the Glendale Police Department. Many of his friends were taken into the hospital with life-threatening injuries and later passed away. Witnessing a donor's generosity and the hospital staff's hard work save Washburn's life gave Rich hope.

Washburn's story inspired Rich to sign up as an organ donor just a couple of weeks after meeting him.

"I hope this story motivates others to make this choice," says Rich. "This man was given the opportunity to live on. He is a living example of why people need to be donors."

ne day in early August 2014, Gary
Johnstone went rappelling with his son,
Alec, and two of Alec's friends on the
Sugar Cube rock formation near the beginning of
Echo Canyon Trail in Phoenix, AZ. This adventure
ended in tragedy, as Gary and one of Alec's friends
both suffered a deadly fall and passed away.

A firefighter for 25 years; he worked with Sun City Fire Department and Phoenix Fire Department. This career allowed Gary the opportunity to help people during some of their most tragic moments, a gift that he embraced and carried on even after he passed away as a tissue donor. Every day was a search for adventure for him, but above all Gary always knew he wanted to save lives. From his early childhood, he aspired to a career that would let him make a positive impact in the world.

Gary was married to his wife, Lisa, and was also a generous father to their three boys: Alec, 17; Nathaniel, 15; and Lucas, 14. He was just as much a kid as his boys, and being with his kids made him happier than anything else in the world. Lisa says, "The thing that the boys miss most was that he would always come home from work and ask, 'What adventure are we going to have today?'"

Gary's tissue donation provided his family with a small glimmer of hope through this tragedy. His corneas went to two different people in Arizona while his skin went on to help others, including burn victims.

He was always supportive of donation and knew the value of giving life to others.

"When I got the letter that said he was able to donate all those things it was just so wonderful," says Lisa. "I talk to my friends about donation all the time. It would be a shame not to pass on life to others."

Gary enjoyed playing the bagpipes. He was part of the Honor Guard Pipes and Drums, a band that represents the fire department and honors fallen public safety officers by playing at their funerals and memorials.

"Gary played 'Amazing Grace' on the bagpipes hundreds of times in his career," Lisa says. "When I think back to the words of 'Amazing Grace,' and the lyrics 'I once was blind and now I see,' I think of Donor Network and the fact that Gary gave sight to others."

Lisa honored her late husband on their wedding anniversary, Dec. 21, by putting on his firefighter uniform and hiking up to the place where he died to spread rose petals.

"Of all the things that happened [when he passed], getting that call that he was able to donate was the best thing that happened that day," Lisa says.
